



### THE BIBLE – 'HIS STORY' – A BEAUTIFUL ROMANCE

Dear All,

#### "Who is this that even the wind and waves obey Him?"

Devastating sickness, devastating floods, devastating death, devastating evil... we have witnessed all these in the world this February.



Coronavirus, storms Chiara and Dennis, the death of Caroline Flack and atrocities in Syria have disturbed us all in what is normally the relatively cocooned existence of life in South Ribble. But as we are told in the Bible, 'there is nothing new under the sun'; all these things were there in Jesus' time too. And Jesus alone in human history is able to master them.

Those who have joined our new Christianity Explored course have seen how in Mark's Gospel Jesus' identity is revealed step by step as He heals the sick, calms the storm, raises the dead and forgives sin. Jesus is no ordinary teacher and healer: only God Himself can control nature, overcome death and bring us sinful, selfish people back to Himself.

At the centre of the Christian faith is a person – Jesus. He is God's Chosen King who is alive now and in control of His world as we have been learning through the dramatic story of Joseph and his Dream Coat. Through His great love for each of us, Jesus died on the cross so that our sins can be forgiven and we can make a new start with the sure and certain hope of eternal life.

Why not resolve this Lent to find out more and get to know Jesus or deepen your relationship with Him? Lent begins on Ash Wednesday 27th Feb; there is a service of Holy Communion at 7.30pm at St Michael's and every Monday and Tuesday throughout Lent. There are stand-alone sessions of Christianity Explored in the Rectory at 7.30pm (see below for details). You are all warmly invited. And why not read a passage of St Mark's Gospel in a modern translation every day to draw closer to God's Chosen King Jesus Christ.

## TRIP TO THE NATIONAL ARBORETUM

The Social Committee are organising a coach trip to the National Arboretum, in Stafford, on Wednesday, 29<sup>th</sup> July, 2020.

Depending on numbers, the cost of the trip is approximately £17.

There is a small train which tours the site and has a recorded commentary, which has reserved seats for an extra £5.

The Arboretum contains 30,000 trees, with more being added each year. There are more than 350 memorials for the armed forces, civilian organisations and voluntary bodies who have played a part in serving the country; and even HMS *Amethyst's* cat Simon.

At the heart of the Arboretum is the *Armed Forces Memorial*, which is a tribute to over 16,000 service personnel who have lost their lives in conflict or as a result of terrorism since the end of the Second World War. At 11 am on 11 November each year the sun shines through two slits in the outer and inner walls of the memorial, casting a shaft of light across a wreath in the centre. The Armed Forces Memorial was dedicated in October 2007 by the Archbishop of Canterbury in the presence of the Queen.

Other areas of the site include an RAF 'wing', Naval review and Army parade. Civilian areas include 'The Beat' which contains memorials and dedications to police forces from around the UK and commonwealth.

Within the Arboretum is the Millennium Chapel of Peace and Forgiveness where, at 11 am each day, an act of remembrance takes place. Following the two minutes silence, accompanied by the Last Post and Reveille, there is an introductory talk about the arboretum.

Daily Activities on site include guided walks, buggy tours, Land Train rides and free talks, as well as the Daily Act of Remembrance.

You may have noticed something different about WaterAid's logo! It's a new look for us and something we hope captures the contemporary, exciting and bold direction that we're taking in all aspects our work. We hope you like it!

The symbol in our new logo holds a number of special meanings:

- It visually conveys, through the three raised fingers, our three goals of clean water, decent toilets and good hygiene for everyone, everywhere
- It represents a hand holding up three fingers, an active, human gesture that means 'w' and 'water' in international sign language
- It is composed of the letter 'w' in the top half and a letter 'a' in the bottom half, visually representing the name WaterAid
- It includes a water drop at the centre of the palm

## <u>Hoole St Michael CE Primary School – March 2020</u> Communion

Recently we have been learning about Communion. We have had 3 different visitors from different churches Reverend Katharine, Reverend Bloomfield and Reverend Ann Templeton. Bread and wine are used in Communion that is also called Eucharist or Mass.

We know how God wants communion to be from Jesus' words at the Last Supper.

"Take this and eat of it for this is my body shared out for you." "Drink it all of you this is my blood which seals God's covenant. My blood is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins."

#### **Reverend Katherine:**

First, Reverend Katherine came in and talked to us about what they do at her church. She began by talking to us about memories and asked us whether we had any **SPECIAL** memories. She explained that Matthew, who recorded the last supper, wrote this event down because it was a special memory to him. At her church, they have normal bread, grapes and grape juice (non-alcoholic.) After we had tried the bread and grapes, we finished with a prayer.



#### **Reverend Bloomfield:**

Reverend Bloomfield is a Baptist minister and he explained to us communion is not all about prayers and blessings but about ourselves. We have to look inwards, outwards, forwards and backwards. We also look at freedom and free choices, that everyone has time to feel emotions and that it is important we can reflect on our lives. Instead of using the gospel of Matthew, Rev. Bloomfield used Paul's letters to the Corinthians to show us how important communion is to God as Paul explains how this should be done.



#### Reverend Ann:

Reverend Ann explained that in a Communion service Christians eat the bread and drink the wine to remember that Jesus died for them on the cross. Jesus told his followers to do this at the Last Supper. She then explained about the items that are important in the service. We learnt about the chalice, which is the cup that holds the wine, and the paten, which holds the bread. Rev. Ann also talked about the special prayer that Christians say during the service. We looked at the Gospel of Matthew, and how this explains the Last Supper.



We will be continuing our learning about communion this half term by looking at Easter being a victory for Christians.

#### All in the month of MARCH – Good things and bad

It was:

 $200\ years$  ago, on  $10^{\rm th}\ March$  1820 that the Royal Astronomical Society was founded in Britain.

175 years ago, on 17<sup>th</sup> March 1845 that one Henry Jones, a baker from Bristol, was granted a patent for his invention of self-raising flour.

90 years ago, on 12<sup>th</sup> March 1930 that Indian political spiritual leader Mahatma Gandhi led 78 activists and followers on a 23-day 'salt march' to protest against a British tax on salt and British rule in India. On 5<sup>th</sup> April he reached the sea and made salt, breaking British law. On 4<sup>th</sup> May he was arrested and imprisoned.

80 years ago, on 18<sup>th</sup> March 1940 that Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini met at Brenner Pass in the Alps. The Italian dictator agreed to join Germany's war against France and Britain.

70 years ago, on 8<sup>th</sup> March 1950 that Volkswagen launched the Type 2/Transporter van – also known as the Camper, Bus, microbus or Kombi. It became the best-selling van in history, and early versions remain much-loved icons of the counterculture/hippie movement.


60 years ago, on 21<sup>st</sup> March 1960 that the Sharpeville Massacre, South Africa, took place. Police opened fire on a group of black anti-apartheid demonstrators, killing 69 and wounding 180.

50 years ago, on  $5^{\rm th}$  March 1970 that the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons came into effect.

40 years ago, on 21<sup>st</sup> March 1980 that in the TV soap opera Dallas, the character J R Ewing was shot by an unseen assailant. This led to the famous catchphrase 'Who shot J.R.?' The answer (Kristin Shepard) was revealed that November.
