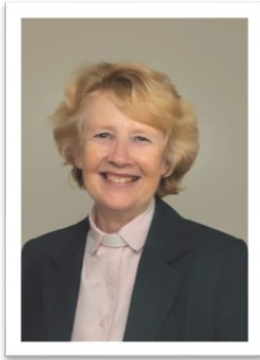

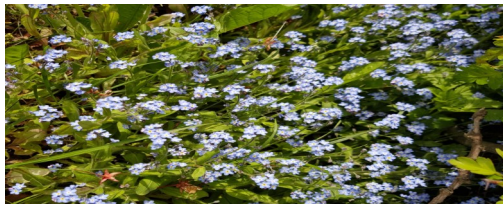

EASTER SUNDAY—Matthew 28: v 1-10

No-one will ever forget Lockdown. Our grandchildren are all keeping Lockdown diaries which I am sure they will want to show to their own children. Our life now is History in the making. And we know when it's all over that the world will be a different world. There will be no 'getting back to normal' - things have changed irrevocably. Our social, our political, our financial landscapes – the whole of our lives- can never be the same again.

As we wrestle with that disturbing truth, it is Easter morning. Jesus, the One who was crucified, dead and buried is not in the tomb. The tomb is empty. The women - ever practical in handling their grief - had set off to anoint the body. Their world had been shattered but instead of remaining in their self-imposed lockdown despite their fear of the authorities, they decided that they had to do something. They got as we heard much more than they bargained. Matthew's account of the first Easter Day is much the most dramatic of the 4 Gospels: an earthquake, an angel, the guards unconsciousand then the earth shattering news that Jesus is not there. He has been raised from the dead just as He said He would be. Matthew is making it crystal clear that God is at work here, supernaturally; He is starting something completely new; the world can never be the same again. A new era is beginning and the women were the ones who were to begin the great task of telling others that Jesus is alive and everything has changed.

Look for a moment at the women's reaction to the Angel's message; afraid yet filled with joy – a mixture of terror and delight. Just as you would be. Faced with the evidence of an empty tomb, of a corpse vanishing, who would not be frightened? And make no mistake the evidence of the empty tomb is solid; those who spend time studying the evidence often end up with an unshakeable conviction that the Resurrection of Jesus is true, that no human explanation satisfactorily explains why the tomb was empty that first Easter morning. If there was still a corpse the authorities would have produced it. If the disciples had known where the body was they would not have given their lives insisting Jesus had risen. If Jesus was not alive and real to his followers then the Christian Church would never have grown exponentially so fast until today a third of the world, over 3 billion people, claim He lives.



THANK YOU FROM OKOROM VILLAGE

The faithfulness and love of the parish of St. Michael's is very special. Uganda is also in lockdown so letters written to you have not been sent. Everything has stopped, schools, churches, shops, post offices, even buses.

However, messages of love and thanks come to you from the community. They now have water at the school and church, having been able pay for a pipe from the new main water pipe from the lake at Argu to the township of Kapir.

They have also been able to wire the school for electricity, a requirement from the government before they will divert electricity to the school.

This means that children can study at school in the evenings, particularly important for the ones in P7, preparing for the Primary Leaving Examination.

This is a bit like our 11+, it dictates the level of secondary school.

For the last 2 years they have had students reach division 1, a great achievement.

One of the former students of the community, since the involvement of St Michael's, has just completed his MA in International and Diplomatic Studies.

He has also started a profile of a project based at the school (off his own bat and funding), for the vulnerable children in the 6 surrounding villages.

All this is possible because you have helped this small community to develop and reach a potential it only ever dreamed of.

I don't have the words to thank you.

SUNDAY AFTER EASTER

“FROM FEAR TO FAITH”

READING John 20: v19-31.

Back to Thomas, plagued by his doubts. And it is doubt that needs to be dealt with. Someone has said that doubt is the dark room where the devil develops his negatives. Let's notice the good things about Thomas though, at the same time as his doubt.

a) he is honest about his doubt - he can't believe, and he says so

b) he is reasonable in his doubt - he demands evidence. And Christianity has never been frightened of that - it is a rational faith.

c) and lastly Thomas seems to have realised how important the resurrection is. The resurrection is vital - it is everything, or Christianity is nothing. It was essential that Jesus' body had come through death, and that the resurrection is true.

And then a week later, perhaps at the same time, we don't know, Jesus appears. Again Jesus greets them with peace, and immediately turns to Thomas. OK then, do what you demanded; but stop doubting and believe. And Thomas it seems doesn't even need to touch Jesus - he just makes this confession - My Lord and my God, the first human being in the Gospels to address Jesus as God. And then Jesus continues the rebuke. your belief is not so blessed, Thomas, as those who have not seen. You'll probably spend the next week wishing you had believed the others in the first place. And then, in a lovely verse, Jesus refers to all subsequent Christians, including people in 21 century Lancashire "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe". That's us - that's you and me, together with millions of others who have listened to the Gospel story, and who have believed; who have not seen Jesus physically, but have nonetheless believed.

And this peace that Jesus bequeathed is available to us. It does not remove problems like the coronavirus, but Jesus' peace has made all the difference to Christians who over the years have had to face all kinds of problems and difficulties, worries, concerns and anxieties. Jesus' peace can transcend the things we face, and give us a new confidence to go forward, knowing that the future is in His hands.

At this most difficult and perplexing time we turn to you, our Heavenly Father for strength and guidance.

Walk for us Lord down the streets of our cities, towns and villages as we pray for our country and our world beset by pandemic – walk today where many of us cannot go because we are in lockdown, visit our friends and family, hug and kiss those whom we love and from whom we are separated, light the candle of love, protection and faith in all our hearts until we can be together again.

Lord in your mercy.....Hear our prayer.

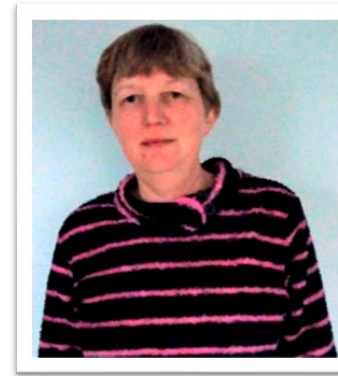
We give thanks for the lives of all those known to us who have died recently and all those whose anniversary falls at this time. We pray for your continuing comfort for all those who mourn
