

## FROM THE RECTORY REJOICE IN THE LORD ALWAYS. AGAIN I SAY REJOICE

Dear all

It is wonderful to be back in our beautiful church again -we have indeed much to rejoice about. We have now held live services on three Sundays and it has been brilliant to worship together again, to see people in person and catch up on news. Of course, it has felt strange to be seated socially



distanced in alternate pews with sanitised hands and frustrating not to be able to sing yet in church. However, it has been perfectly ok and we are getting used to it. We have our two excellent organists and we now have a data projector to project the words of the service attractively when it is not possible to use service books. It has been great to be able to broadcast the service outside and around 15 people each Sunday have been seated in chairs outside in the sunshine to worship, thus enabling some of the vulnerable members of our country to be able to attend.

We have started up Sunday school too outside which has worked well as the rain has held off. This has been a great opportunity for some children to meet up with their friends once more, especially for those without siblings who have not yet been able to return to school.

We are continuing with Sunday school throughout the summer this year and are delighted that Liz Boland our young people's minister is going to be able to give us more time in the coming year.

We are holding a **PRAISE PICNIC** for all the family on Sunday 9th August at 12 noon on the school field. Please bring your own lunch and something to sit on. And bring a teddy too if you have one. There will be songs and hymns and readings as well as games and a bouncy castle.

Families please note that **HOGWARTS** Church will be at 3.45 on Sunday 13th September in St Michael's Church. This will be suitable for

all the family with clips form the Harry Potter films, a Harry Potter quiz and Hogwarts games. Come in costume if you have one.

A group of us have been looking together on Zoom each week at Paul's letter to Christians in Philippi, written when Paul was in prison in 'Rome. Despite his terrible situation – he knew he was facing execution – he is able to put his sufferings in an eternal perspective – 'For me to live is Christ and to die is gain' and so helps the Philippians to do the same. It's a letter that speaks very powerfully and practically to our situation too.

In an inspirational section in chapter 4, Paul gives his readers them a command and then a promise. He tells them not to be anxious about anything but in everything with thanksgiving to present their requests to God. And he gives them the promise that the peace of God which passes all understanding will keep their hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. Sound too good to be true? Try it! Thanking God daily for all the good things He showers upon us and asking him for all that we need will help enormously to put all the real suffering and anxiety so many of us are going through in an eternal perspective. 

Unfortunately, due ill health, he will no longer be able to carry out this role so we are in real need of a replacement volunteer to take this on **BY THE END OF THE YEAR**.

If so, please get in touch with me as the PCC and the all the Church groups really, really need someone do to this.

#### A quick summary of the role:

Every January/February, after the financial year end on 31<sup>st</sup> December, I gather in all the ledgers and files from all the Church groups. I check through them within the limits of my ability, then pass them onto the Church examiner who goes through them with a fine toothcomb. The examiner needs to check all figures are correct and that relevant information has been disclosed in the reports to match the financial reports.

Then the reports and accounts need to be signed off in good time for the APCM – usually scheduled in April of each year.

If you think you might, just possibly might, be able to assist at all, or know anyone who might be able to assist – please contact me to discuss.

All enquiries treated as just that, an enquiry, and no obligation comes with an enquiry.

Please put your thinking cap on and help if you can either by making an enquiry yourself or making an enquiry with someone you know perhaps? It is a once a year job.

#### CHARITABLE DONATIONS FROM ST MICHAEL'S

As most of you will be aware, our Church regularly supports FOMO, Okorom Village and Churches Together in Penwortham (the foodbank).

\*\*\*By the way – the foodbank box for donations is still in the front porch and regularly emptied by Margaret and passed on\*\*\*

Please do keep your food donations coming in.

Due to lockdown, we the PCC were unable to have our normal annual review on this matter so a contingency decision was made in April to give to the above charities (£300 each) as they needed it more than we did.

We normally do this about 3 times a year. The second round of donations went out in July with full PCC approval. The third round has not yet been decided upon.

If you are aware of any charity that you feel may benefit from our assistance please let me know.

We do generally prefer to donate to local charities or ones that have a local connection but that is not set in stone.

Our first thank you has arrived from Elizabeth Swarbrick, our connection with Okorom Village, with an update on their situation:

Thank you for your email and the continuing support of St Michael's.

I have heard from Afrinspire (the organisation that channels our donations to where it is needed) that the money has reached them and it will be transferred in August – we just missed the July transfer.

I have been in touch with folk during the lockdown and many are in difficulty. Those who have land are relatively Ok with food but there are many who are struggling. We have been able to distribute food and the children are receiving work from school to do at home but it is hard; as it is here. A bigger problem is the rise in domestic violence but they have already formed groups to help deal with this, there have been teaching sessions and there is someone in each area who has been trained to identify the problem and help the families concerned. Worship has not resumed in churches but each week there is a lot of teaching on teh local radio with Sunday Worship as well.

On-line stuff is limited but there are some who can access it on their phones – this is particularly difficult for those children who are doing their "O" levels in November My foster daughter's eldest has gone to Mbale to stay with a family friend who has a lap top – we're managing to get round problems as best we can. So far the virus hasn't claimed lives in Uganda but folks are taking as many precautions as they can.

# Eulogy for Pearl Read which was written and given at the funeral service by Stan Pickles

Everyone here knew Pearl, but all of us only knew some aspects of her life. I'd like to tell you about the whole Pearl.

If she was here today Pearl would say - 'Don't be sad because I'm gone – be happy that I was here. Remember all our good times, laugh at all my crazy times, and smile when you think of me – knowing that I lived my life in my own unique style'.

Pearl was born in 1942 a first child for Annie and Stanley Melling. It was war time and it was quite a few months before Pearl's dad set eyes on her. It was a time of hardship, rations and uncertainty. After the war, with the country trying to rebuild, Pearl's brother Dave was born in 1946. It didn't matter that money was tight, they had a happy childhood and Pearl always remembered her mum and dad taking them out for the day on a Sunday - first in a motorcycle and side car, and then in a car.

When Pearl left school she worked at the Co-op and loved her job. She was trained in all aspects of the grocery business and could remember the price of everything and mentally add up customer's bills like a professional. She carried that skill all through her life and always knew where to get the best deals.

As a teenager Pearl was never short of admirers as she had a natural beauty and a wit to go with it. In 1960 she met George and boy did he have to step up to the mark! They had different personalities, and as they say 'opposites attract', but they wanted the same things from life, so they shared the same goal. They married in 1962.

When they decided to start a family they agreed that George would be the breadwinner and Pearl wanted to be a 'stay at home' mum. David was born in 1964 followed by Elaine in 1966 and their family was complete. As with all children they could be good, but also mischievous and naughty at



times - and perhaps here, in God's house, it's not the best place to bring up certain escapades!

In 1970 Pearl gained a new sister-in-law, Denise, who remembers that despite some hard times Pearl never wavered from wanting to be a mum at home to bring up her children, her way. She remembers the time Pearl told her about when she had only 3 pence in her purse, which was not enough to buy the bread the family needed. So, she opened her cupboards and baked her own, which lasted till payday. Pearl was a wonderful cook and could create a delicious meal from almost nothing; something her sister-in-law admitted she could never do to this day, no matter how hard she tried.

As the children grew, and David went to school, Pearl began some part-time work; but only when George was home to watch the children or she was able to take Elaine into work with her for a couple of hours. This extra bit of money enabled them to buy their first car. Sunday family trips became something they all looked forward to, sometimes on their own or sometimes with other family groups. Pearl loved walking and the countryside. She loved anything that grew in the ground and would talk to every animal or bird that came into sight. She was a real animal lover – dogs, cats, guinea pigs, rabbits, birds; in fact, anything that lived on God's earth she was in awe of, all through her life. She loved the birds coming into her garden, feeding them daily; and she even got George to make a hedgehog house as she once saw a hedgehog in her garden.

In 1980 Pearl met Doreen, who was to become her lifelong best friend. They met when Pearl began working at New Manor and, on her first shift, Doreen was allocated the 'new girl'. Doreen remembers asking Pearl if she could spell "diarrhoea" as she always struggled with it, and it was a word that was written many times in client's notes. They bonded immediately and they would travel life's bumpy road together.

They developed a love for shopping and spent many a day together in Southport or Liverpool. Over the years (as their children flew the nest) they gained a taste for the finer things in life. With shopping bags on their arms they'd finish their day in perhaps a bar or hotel as they pondered their purchases. Sometimes, they'd have to work out how many overtime shifts they'd need to work; to make up for what they'd spent.

Pearl and George became grandparents, as David and Ann welcomed three beautiful girls – Gemma, Natalie and Louise into their family. They

loved them dearly and were so proud of them as they grew into young ladies.

It was during this period that Pearl and George began to travel overseas and experience foreign holidays and cruising. Pearl saw the wonder of all these new places and when one holiday was finished, she was thinking of the next.

Once Denise's children had flown the nest the two of them began experiencing small trips away together. First there were coach Christmas market or concert trips, then – over the years they developed into holidays further afield. When Dave and Denise went to Australia one time, Pearl flew out for a week to join them; stopping off in Singapore on the way back. Singapore became a place Pearl loved and they visited many times.

Although not a regular church-goer in her early life, there was always this underlying faith and belief which resurfaced, and she began to explore and deepen her faith.

In 2013 Pearl lost George, her soul-mate, and she was devastated. Elaine became a massive daily support as her Mum adjusted to a different life. Pearl would often say how lucky she was to have such a wonderful daughter. She tried to fill the great void in her life and threw herself into many activities – WI, Ladies' Group, flower club, and arts and craft. During this time Pearl also supported her sister-in-law as they both cared for Pearl's brother, Dave, after he was diagnosed with cancer. Sadly Dave passed away only 10 months after George.

From a chance meeting with an old friend, Winn, another close friendship blossomed. And it wasn't long before Pearl, Denise and Winn were off enjoying days out, trips and holidays.

Looking back Pearl did not live an average life, she packed enough diverse experiences into her life that would take the average person two lifetimes. Each of us will have our own wonderful memories we shared with Pearl over the years. So how can we sum up Pearl – a loving wife, mother and Grandma, who adored her family. She was bubbly and high spirited but was also a trusted, loyal and generous friend.

So here we are, as we make ready to lay her to rest with her beloved George; we should each say our final farewell, remembering our own private memory of Pearl and know that she will be with her loving God who supported her throughout life, and loved her unconditionally.

Night, night and God Bless, Pearl.

## Thoughts from the Children's Worker



During this time of lockdown, and not being able to meet together at church, I have been brought back to the verse: *"And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another"* (Hebrews 10 v24-25.) For all the difficulties of lockdown, imagine how much harder it would have been without all the technology we have at our fingertips. We have been able to video

call family and friends, watch 24 hour television, phone people, stream our services and Sunday School on the internet and so much more.

As I write this, I should be preparing for two weeks of Beach Mission in Lincolnshire, but for the first time since 1886, apart from the World Wars, we have had to cancel. But like so many things, we are carrying on online. I have an amazing team of people busily recording and editing videos, and preparing live Zoom meetings with all our children, young people and adults. We will carry on meeting together, but as I reflected, I wondered about the team. A lot of what makes the Beach Mission great is the team – we eat together, work together, live together, pray together, laugh together, clean toilets together and so on. We can't do that. So we will have meals together via Zoom; we are still in prayer triplets to encourage each other and pray together and we will get together online each evening of the mission to pray together.

Now that church is open again, Sunday School has been running for a few weeks and it has been such a great thing for some of the children who haven't played with or spent time with other children since school closed on 20<sup>th</sup> March. This year, we will carry on with Sunday School during the summer holidays, but it is to be different. We will be Summer Explorers (see poster on page 9) as we look at God's amazing world and our place in it. Please do join us if you can and let us keep on encouraging one another as life begins to return to some sort of normality. Liz Boland

Kathleen commented: "When I was very poorly writing and using my imagination became the thing I could do. I would sit at my laptop and work when I was well enough. I joined the writers' group and they gave me a lot of encouragement".

The book is about how Christie's personality evolves. It has been described as Bridget Jones' Diary meets Long Lost Families. "She's well established with a job and friends but then this famous woman says she wants her back and she has to negotiate this as her life cascades into chaos. "It's about relationships really. There's a lot of typical chick-lit things in there: romance, comedy, friendships, families."

Kathleen has worked on the Clunan's stall, which sells cooked meats, pies and other similar food items, in Wigan for years and the business is now a real family affair, with her husband Jeremy, sister Danii, son Joe and daughter Lydia all involved. Kathleen began writing her book while suffering with rheumatoid arthritis and was then off work again after being diagnosed with an autoimmune disease.

She discovered her love of literature at high school, having initially found reading hard, and says it is the page-turning quality of a book and the ability to get engrossed in a good tale that she enjoys most.

She is already working on another book and says she hopes people currently chafing against the lockdown due to Covid-19 can take inspiration from how she found an outlet in writing at a time in her life when her health meant she could not do much.

She said: "I always thought I could write but I used to really struggle and was a very poor reader. At high school my English teacher gave me books which I found very interesting and that was when I got the reading bug. The writing bug came afterwards. I love the escapism of a book and not being able to put it down.

I've had some really nice reviews for my writing already. One person read the book in two days and then asked when the next one would be out.

This pandemic is really affecting people badly, but they could look at it as an opportunity. That's how I looked at being ill. You've got to look at what you can do and make the most even of pretty rubbish situations. It looks awful at first, but you need to embrace the trauma and come out of it stronger, otherwise it just diminishes you."

Kathleen is currently getting a website developed and is hoping to do a book signing in Wigan once it is safe to do so.






