## **DEAD MAN LIVES!**

Jerusalem (Sunday) – This troubled city seethes with rumour and counter-rumour. What began as a routine execution on Friday has backfired on the Roman and Jewish authorities with report after report coming in of personal sightings of the dead man. His death was spectacular in the eerie darkness of a full solar eclipse, climaxed by heavy earth tremors, and the tearing of the Temple curtain shielding the holy of holies from the public. The officer on duty was heard to exclaim, “Surely this was the SON of GOD”.

**Think about the above headline DEAD MAN LIVES! There isn't a person on the planet who wouldn't want to know more of this story.**

Could it be true? Could this incredible story from AD30 be fact? Is it possible that a human being could actually come back to life from the dead?

The answer of Jesus disciples and the 500 early Christians who met the risen Jesus and for billions of Christians since it is:

**“Yes, it is true: Jesus is alive; I know Him.”**

People then were no more gullible than people today. They knew that dead people don't come back to life. Do you remember what happened to Jesus' disciple Thomas?

# *The True Meaning of Easter*



Easter, what is it about? While Family get togethers, bank holidays and egg rolling in Preston's Avenham Park are wonderful traditions, do we really understand the enormity of what God is and has done for us and the world? Or are we living in the land of bunnies, Easter eggs and pagan festivals for new beginnings?

Easter begins with the cross, this is the symbol of our Christian faith where Jesus offered up himself to take on the sins of all of us to reconcile us to God. Good Friday is the day that we meditate on the cross and what Jesus has done for us. To die on a cross is painful and humiliating but Jesus voluntarily accepted his mission to take the sins of the world upon himself and pay the penalty for our sins. This is what He came to do and why He died with a great shout of triumph.

**“It is finished’, it has been accomplished, I have achieved what I came to do.”**



The events of Good Friday became even more dramatic as we are told that the Temple Curtain was torn in two and the sky darkened. This heavy curtain was in the inner section of the Temple and protected the Ark of the Covenant or the Holy of Holies where only the High Priest was allowed to enter. When the curtain tore it was a sign that God was no longer separated from us, his sinful people.

What, then, does this all mean for us personally? This means that death is now conquered, for everyone who answers Jesus' call, and that we do not need to fear death despite it eventually coming to us all.

I draw on my own life experiences of death and bereavement to be able to say that I believe that death is not the end. Jesus gives us hope and assurance that we will be with him in Glory. Our loved ones, who have gone before us, are in his care and at the end we will be reunited with them. I truly believe this and as a result life feels richer and filled with purpose. It does however not take away the sadness of loss but helps to heal the pain over time, leaving us so much to look forward to as we live our lives with Jesus.





# Carr House - A History

## *Jane Elphick*



As the crow flies, across the fields, Carr House is about a third of a mile from St Michael's Church and is one of the oldest residences in the area. The house was built in 1613 by Andrew and Thomas Stones, and an inscription over the front door states it was built for their brother John Stones. Quite why they were so generous is unclear. Andrew and Thomas were successful merchants, trading in wool and cloth between Hoole and Amsterdam, probably with connections in London, but John's lifestyle is less clear.

From an architectural point of view, Carr House is built over three storeys with mullion windows, decorative "blue diamond" brickwork, and handmade bricks. It is highly likely that the bricks were from the Netherlands and brought here as ballast in the trading ships, with ships' masts being used for the timbers – an early example of reusing materials that would have been scarce and expensive to create without modern tools. The staircase is a cage newel design, and sited at the end of the property, suggesting an extension to the other side might have been in the original plan. Both the house and staircase are listed. The house would have been imposing and left visitors in no doubt as to the wealth of the owners, but inside the layout is typical of local farmhouses, being one room deep with three rooms on each storey. Apart from two small additions, the structure of the house has not been altered and remains very similar today to the original design.

There are strong connections between Carr House and St Michael's Church. When built, the house would have been in the parish of St Michael's Croston, but Thomas Stones and his wife Elizabeth appear to have been influential in extending a chapel in Hoole around 1628, to assist parishioners in attending church during times of "inundation", which became St Michael's Church Hoole. There are similarities between the two buildings – e.g. the blue diamond decorative brickwork and handmade bricks. John Stones gave the font in 1633, and silverware and money was donated by Elizabeth and Katrin Stones.

The Stones family were certainly Protestant, and probably sympathetic to the Puritan cause, which was dominant in this area at the time. It is also interesting to note that two of John Stones' sons emigrated to what is now the USA in about 1625, making them among the earliest settlers.

By 1639, Carr House had become the residence of Andrew and Katrin Stones, whose children were probably tutored by Jeremiah Horrocks, and who may well have facilitated Horrocks' curacy at St Michael's. Horrocks lodged at Carr House and made his now-famous observations of the transit of Venus from the window in November 1639. He is commemorated in both St Michael's Church and Westminster Abbey.

More research is required about how ownership of Carr House moved away from the Stones family – there are various possibilities which I hope to follow up. What is known though is that in 1710 William Dandy and Isabel Wilson were married at St Michael's Hoole, and took up residence in Carr House. They had 12 children, of whom only five survived into adulthood. Three of their daughters all married into well-established local families, and it was the youngest of these – Jennet Dandy – who remained living in Carr House after her marriage in 1746 to Henry Bretherton. Jennet and Henry Bretherton farmed the land around Carr House and raised six children. There are quite good records of the baptisms, marriages and deaths in this family, which I have enjoyed researching. Both Jennet and Henry lived to what would then have been considered very good ages – Jennet died in 1806 at the age of 86, and Henry predeceased her in 1797 aged 81. You might think that one or more of their children would have taken over Carr House by this time, but sadly it seems two had already died, another son William probably died in the same year as his mother, and it seems likely that the remaining three all died in the same year as each other in 1819. Although there were probably grandchildren around the area, there are no records of them living in Carr House, and the property passed into the estate of Lord Lilford in around 1820.

For about the next 130 years, Carr House was the residence of various tenant farmers, most of whom were members of the Taylor family. There are still members of the Taylor family living in Hoole today, and I am slowly piecing together a fuller chronology of this period. By the early 1900's, the tenancy passed to Mary Taylor, who continued with the family dairy farm after her marriage to Frank Kirby. Mary and Frank Kirby had four daughters, all born in the 1920's, and all married from Carr House. We had the pleasure of inviting three of these sisters back to their childhood home at the time of the transit celebrations in 2004, with other members of their family. It was fascinating to hear them talk of life on the farm, the jobs they were assigned to help out, and their memories of their mother Mary tending the roses in rare moments of relaxation (we still have roses today). Sadly, following the deaths of Mary and Frank Kirby, the farming tenancy was not sustainable, Carr House gradually fell into disrepair, and by the late 1950's was uninhabitable.

In 1965, Lady Lilford obtained a government grant and set about renovating Carr House. In 1966 Barry Elder took up the tenancy and used Carr House to accommodate his large collection of dolls. He opened the house to the public as a doll museum – a period many local people recall well, although most seem to have found it scary, dark, and with lots of doll's eyes seeming to follow them around! The museum was closed in the 1970's with most of the dolls moving to Lancaster Museum, and the house had several short-term tenants. In the late 1980's, Mike and Lisa Redshaw moved into Carr House and undertook further renovation and modernisation to make it their family home. We bought the property from them in 2002, and were fascinated to read the old deeds, which were beautifully handwritten and almost impossible to understand! Since then, we have enjoyed developing our knowledge of the house's history and connections with astronomy and have met so many interesting people in the process. If you have any memories of Carr House that might help to fill in the gaps in the narrative, especially the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries, we would love to hear from you!

On Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> April, we look forward to Julia Howarth from Fitright Footwear, Clitheroe coming to talk to us.





## *A beautiful retreat...*

One unexpectedly warm October day some time ago, I was asked to imagine that I was at The Last Supper – in what capacity; who else is there; what is happening; what can I see; what do I want to ask/tell Jesus; how do I feel? I was at a retreat centre with plenty of room for quiet contemplation, so I took advantage of the precious October warmth and sat on the terrace trying to imagine being in such a privileged place. Suddenly I knew who I was...

“I’m a rookie journalist sent by the Jerusalem Tribune to a Passover party being given in town by a celebrity and his friends. I’ve been instructed by my editor to find out as much gossip as I can about this man – I needed a scoop! How can I get near to the house? It’s surrounded by security guards, and there are crowds of people outside. I check my purse, I think I may just have enough money to bribe a guard, so I sidle up to one, put on my most captivating smile, slip some money into his hand and beg to be allowed in. To my absolute astonishment, he waves me through.

Once inside, I look around for this celebrity but initially can’t see him for all the people milling around. Eventually I see him and he’s looking directly at me, and I have never felt so guilty or tongue-tied in my life as when he walks over and starts to chat like a long-lost friend.

When dinner is announced, this man takes his place in the centre of the top table with his close friends around him and the rest of us grabbing a seat wherever we can. Beautiful waitresses serve us, and he speaks kindly to them with none of the usual celebrity arrogance.

Towards the end of the meal, he asks for a bottle of wine and more bread. The room falls silent, such is the presence of this young man. We think he’s going to propose a toast, but why also ask for bread? He fills a glass with the wine and, giving thanks to God, passes it round asking people to drink the wine and pretend that it’s his blood, which he will give for the forgiveness of sins – wow, how can anyone forgive sins? He then picks up the bread and breaks it and again passes it round, telling everyone to eat it as if it were his body, which he will also soon give for them. Now I’m gobsmacked and thinking here’s my scoop; my career’s made!

As I’m dashing out to submit my scoop, this magnetic man follows me out, smiling and asks me what I’m going to write about. How did he know?”

Did I write my story? No, I left that to others because, at that moment, I knew that the only story I wanted to tell was of this wonderful, captivating man whose words, whose kindness, whose generosity, whose actions, whose radiance changed my life forever – not what my editor had in mind!

# Barry's Bookends

I am greatly enjoying *Old Parish Life - A Guide for the Curious* edited by Justin Lovill. (The Bunbury Press, 2022).

There are thousands of references to churchwardens and Vestry records from c1500 to c1700. Here are a few things of the many that caught my attention, one from 1587:

"For breade and beare for " we did ring for joye that the Queene of Skotts that enemy to owre most noble queens majeste and our contrie was beheaded for which the lorde God be praised." There are many accounts of the amount of

ale those bellringers got through.

Attitudes, and payments, to those dealing with the desperate are quite startling. In 1601 for instance: "To Andrews for whipping the vagrants for one whole year 5s.4d." Parishes were careful not to be burdened with extra folk to look after, so, in 1596, payment "To Micaell Hayward for taking a pore woman in a cart from town to town 16d". 1682, "Paid the sexton's wife for getting a sick woman out of the parish.

Likewise, attitudes to the baptism of those born out of wedlock might shock the modern churchwarden: In 1574, on the 6<sup>th</sup> of February, Sara Willson, the daughter of 'strumpett', Mary Willson, "Disorder was recorded", as it was in 1639 when Ralph Brooke was punished for wearing a great paire of hornes upon his head in the churchyard when Henry Hall and his wife were going to be married, shewing thereby that the said Hall was a cuckold." Another fine was issued in 1603" to Joan Golding for baptizing a cat.



This excellent book of 626 pages is a fascinating window on days gone by from which I picked up several curious facts. A hearse was originally a canopy with candles placed over the corpse in the night before a funeral. And the use of a cricket ball is first recorded in 1622 when boys were beaten for playing the game in a churchyard!

# UKRAINE PARTNERSHIP

## ALL SAINTS CHURCH, PRESTON

Through partnership with churches and individuals across the UK and alongside the Government's 'Homes for Ukraine' scheme, members of All Saints Church in Preston have had the opportunity to help some of our brothers and sisters from Ukraine in a very practical way by providing homes and support to a number of Ukrainian refugees since May. Their aim is to continue to finance and care for these people for as long as necessary given the ongoing uncertainty in Ukraine.

At present there are 38 men, women and children being sponsored by the All Saints church family in Preston. Many of those joining them are members of Kharkiv City Church, a church plant which began in 2019, involved in reaching out to those in need in built-up areas in Kharkiv; the majority of their Ukrainian friends joined us having fled Ukraine as the war began in February 2022.

The initial group travelled by car and then by foot from Kharkiv to Romania and then on to Hungary over a couple of weeks. Wonderfully the Lord sustained and protected them as they travelled nearly 2000km to Budapest, all while awaiting visas to enter the UK. Christians throughout Ukraine, Romania and Hungary opened their homes and served them as they travelled.

The All Saints family are so thankful to be able to partner with them now they have arrived in the UK, and to have welcomed others who have arrived from other parts of Ukraine. 
