

Happy New Year!


2022 promises to be a very exciting year for St Michael's - we are hoping to start building our Lodge very soon. This will be a huge asset to our children and young people's work, as well as benefitting the whole of the community.



Baptism and Confirmation

The last six months have been very busy with the joy of many baptisms which are permitted once again.

We hope to be holding a Confirmation service in the summer of 2022; we already have about 7 young people interested. A number of adults also wish to be confirmed; this is particularly relevant for those seeking baptism for their children, or who are keen to grow in their own faith and commitment. Please let me know if you would like to join either of these two groups which will be starting shortly.



This is the famous quotation used by King George VI in his Christmas broadcast 1939 at the outbreak of World War II. The war was to last for six years so his emphasis on the importance of putting your trust in God proved to be vital. God's loving guidance and protection is infinitely safer than any other help we humans could find.

At the beginning of 2022 we find ourselves still in the midst of what has turned out to be a global war against the evil of Covid. We had all assumed it would be over by now, almost two years on, but like our forebears 82 years ago, we find that we and nations throughout the world are struggling against a deadly enemy that still threatens to overwhelm us.

Behind the Haskins quotation is the enormous wealth of Scripture which invites us to put our trust in God – the only One who is able to rescue us from our plight – 'God is our strength and refuge, an everpresent help in trouble. Therefore, we will not fear... The Lord Almighty is with us' (Psalm 46). At Christmas we rejoiced in the coming of Immanuel, the coming of God Himself into our world in the person of His Son Jesus. The great title of Jesus, Immanuel, means 'God with us'. God in Jesus is with us every step of the way. At the beginning of this New Year, we must put our hand in His hand and trust Him to lead us in the right path as we set out into the unknown of 2022.

Life seems more unpredictable than ever; planning with any confidence even to see family and friends or go on holiday is impossible. We have to trust God with a new energy and determination to give us the love and the strength as individuals and as a church that we need, in order to face an uncertain future with Him who is our strength and refuge. There is no better New Year's resolution than this. So why not begin by committing yourself in prayer to Him. Determine to spend time with Him every day in prayer and Bible reading and try the fortnightly Bible Studies. Try praying now, if you dare, this inspirational and challenging prayer of commitment:



THE LODGE PROJECT – FUND-RAISING CAMPAIGN

The Lodge Fund has so far raised £11,947.45 from private donations. These have come as follows:

- Direct donations to the Lodge Fund
- 'Buy-a-Brick' donations
- Hoole Church 'Just Giving' page.

We can add to this approximately £1,950 of Gift Aid claims from tax payers.

The church has also received promissory grants from the following:

- Much Hoole Parish Council £5,500
- Little Hoole Parish Council £5,000
- All Churches Trust £2,250)
- ❖ Blackburn Diocese £20,000.

Along with designated church funds, the total raised is now in excess of the £70,000 required to get the project off the ground. However, we are still fund raising to furnish and fit the building.

All donors should have received a personal thank you from our churchwarden Barbara Wood, for all donations made before 31st

December 2021. If you have not received a thank you and have provided your details with your donations, please get in touch – just in case it has gone "walk about".

To all who have donated anonymously we thank you.

The PCC cannot begin to express our gratitude to all who have donated, large or small, to the Lodge Fund. It is hoped the project will start very soon. An update will be included in the next magazine.

In particular no ornaments or statues are permitted on graves or cremated remains plots, and only fresh flowers in fixed vases are allowed.


Please would you make sure your grave is as it should be by January 31st 2022.


At our following meeting on Tuesday 15th February, Gordon Fletcher's talk is entitled "Greenland - Icecap and Icebergs".

St James the Least of All

On parish accounts, teapots and Labrador retrievers

St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren

Your annual accounts – all 146 pages, bound in their plastic covers and laid out in faultless detail – really are most impressive. I was rather envious to note you have a clergy 'discretionary fund'; if I were to be given such a thing, my cellar of claret would improve immeasurably – although that is perhaps the reason why I am not given one.

The size of your office expenses makes me wonder if you have a staff rivalling that of the European Community. I suppose that at least you are doing your bit for job creation. Our dear Miss Marigold, who spends two hours a week randomly filing pieces of paper, mistyping rotas and failing to re-order stationery, is only rewarded by being the first to find out who is booking marriages and having their babies baptised – and if they do not happen in that order, that will be another piece of information remembered for future use. All this is information beyond the price of jewels in village communities.

Our accounts have more by way of charm than they do of accuracy, generally consisting of one sheet of handwritten paper. There are only ever three copies for circulation, as that is the limit of Colonel Denster's carbon paper. It seems to be an unalterable tradition that they never balance, until we find the following year that the missing £20 was found months later under the teapot on the mantelpiece. One footnote to this was the occasion when the Colonel suspected an unaccountable £5 had been eaten by his Labrador. Our greatest expenses by far are categorised as 'miscellaneous', which is a catch-all for everything that our treasurer is unable to recall where it really went.

The thousands paid on church maintenance and diocesan fees are nodded through without comment – but if the money spent on Easter lilies or packets of tea for the Summer Fete increases by anything more than 50 pence, there will be much agonised debate and speculation about whether this is an indication of money laundering.

I see that your accounts were professionally audited. Fortunately, it does not matter too much about the accuracy of our own as I have an arrangement with our auditor who lives in the village: if he refuses to sign them off, then I refuse to baptise his grandchildren.

Special Days for the New Year

1st February: Brigid of Ireland, showing compassion and love

Brigid, you could say, was the female Patrick of Ireland.

Historical facts about this first abbess of Kildare (d.c. 525) may be scarce, but her 'Lives', written from the 7th century, tell many anecdotes and miracles which over the centuries have become deeply rooted in Irish folklore. Brigid came from a village near Kildare, of parents of humble origin, and is said to have been baptised by Patrick and became a nun at an early age. She is credited with founding the monastery of Kildare, a powerful influence for Christianity in Ireland.

The miracles attributed to Brigid show her to have been a woman of great compassion and generosity. There are stories of how she could multiply food, especially butter, for the poor. Other stories tell of her changing her bathwater to beer, in order to satisfy the thirst of unexpected visitors. Even her cows gave milk three times the same day, to enable visiting bishops to have enough to drink.

Brigid's cult grew rapidly in Ireland, where it became second only to that of Patrick. In England, there were at least 19 ancient church dedications in her honour (the most famous is St Bride's Fleet Street). There is also St Bride's Bay, Dyfed, which underlines the strong connection between Irish and Welsh Christianity. St Brigid is patron of poets, blacksmiths, and healers. She is usually depicted with a cow lying at her feet, which recalls her phase as a nun-cowgirl.

2nd February: Candlemas, the Presentation of Christ in the Temple



In bygone centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the Christmas season on Candlemas, 2nd February. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with

Jesus, her first male child - to 'present Him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus, we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

So, where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name. Candlemas.

The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke 2:22-40. Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is of course found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West. But in medieval times, the Nunc Dimittis was mostly used just on this day, during the distribution of candles before the Eucharist. Only gradually did it win a place in the daily prayer life of the Church.


