



Dear Friends

Tomorrow, 24th February, is Freedom Day. After almost two years of COVID and the severe curtailment of our liberties, finally we will be free.

Or will we? Is it too soon? Is the virus really conquered so we can live with it as we do the common cold? By the time you read this you may have more idea than I do now. Even the most optimistic among us however have learnt that the enemy of coronavirus is not one that so far has gone away quietly.

Today Russian tanks have rolled unopposed into Ukraine. The shadow of war hangs over Europe.

No one can be in any doubt of the reality of sin and evil in our world.

Meanwhile Christians all over the world are about to move into the most solemn of periods of the year – Lent, when they confess the reality of sin and evil in themselves, ask for God's forgiveness and seek God's help to become each day more like the Lord Jesus. We do this of course in the light of the most glorious truth in heaven and earth that God himself saw our plight, saw the great barrier of selfishness and sin which we had erected between ourselves and Him and out of His infinite love took action in the only way possible. He sent His son Jesus into the world to die on the cross to take away the consequences of our sin. Then to prove that this amazing message of reconciliation and a new start for mankind was real, he raised Jesus from the dead on the first Easter day in AD30 – the historical event which changed human history for ever.

John in his Gospel describes it like this:

FOR GOD SO LOVED THE WORLD THAT HE GAVE HIS ONLY SON THAT WHOEVER BELIEVES IN HIM SHOULD NOT PERISH BUT HAVE ETERNAL LIFE *John3 v 16*


This is the heart of the Gospel, the Good News, the central mind blowing fact of Christianity that God has taken the initiative and through the cross and resurrection of Jesus Christ has given his creatures a way out of the mess they are in.

So take time this Easter to find out more; to go deeper into the Cross of Christ and why Jesus had to die, and then rejoice with those first Christians on that first Easter morning that Jesus is risen and death is dead.


Our bishops have produced a special booklet of daily **Bible** readings for which take us through the whole of John's Gospel; they are completely free just help yourself to one at the back of the church.


PASSOVER MEAL



Putting Jesus on Trial Steve Newman

Writing a play about Jesus, and his trial on Good Friday is, to say the least, a bit daunting. Many have tried, not least Denis Potter, and the Cretan writer, Nikos Kazantzakis, for which he was much criticised. Even Shakespeare avoided the life and death of Jesus.

But, by concentrating on the last day of Jesus's earthly life, and to put across the exchanges, and the frustrations and, it must be said, the necessary cowardice of Pilate, always set against the calming spirit of Jesus (alongside the betrayal of Judas, and the heart-breaking denials of Peter), who knows full well he must die is a trial of a different sort. And then we have the ever-growing anger of the crowds braying for the crucifixion of 'The King of the Jews'. And to tell all of this within a church service held on one of Christianity's most precious of days is something a playwright and players shouldn't turn away from.

Well, this year the newly formed St. Michael's Players will take on the staging of *The Trial*, not as a dramatic reading, but as a fully rehearsed drama that will, hopefully, in a twenty-five-minute slot, get to the beating heart of that day, and of Christianity itself. That is the hope.



I have written plays which involved Christianity in one way or another for some years and which were produced at our previous church, Holy Trinity, and am looking forward to producing my new play *The Trial*.

The intent of St Michael's Players is to create a flexible drama group for all ages made up of members of the congregation who can present drama that is new, and specifically written for them, and by so doing unfold a rare truth.

The Trial is the first.

The last Passover

On the night before He died, Jesus ate His last Passover meal with His disciples. He then transformed the Passover into the Lord's Supper, saying of the bread and wine that, 'this is my body' and 'this is my blood'. Jesus, the Lamb of God, was preparing to die for the sins of the whole world. John's gospel makes it clear that the Last Supper took place the evening BEFORE the regular Passover meal, and that later Jesus died *at the same time* that the Passover lambs were killed. Jesus then astonished the disciples by washing their feet. He said: "A new command I give you: love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another. In Latin, the opening phrase of this sentence is 'mandatum novum do vobis'. The word 'maundy' is thus a corruption of the Latin 'mandatum' (or command).


