FROM THE RECTORY

Dear all



On 23rd May 2021, the Christian Church will be 1991 years old. The drama began with an explosion of power from on high. Looking like fire and sounding like a violent wind, the Holy Spirit suddenly came upon a group of fearful men and women together in the Upper room in Jerusalem 30AD. They had all met the risen Jesus a number of times; they had seen him disappear from their sight just 10 days previously and had prayed and waited for this moment when they were filled with the Holy Spirit. And they were transformed, totally changed. The multinational crowd gathered for the Jewish festival of Pentecost, heard them in their own languages preaching with great power the good news of Jesus who had conquered death itself. 3,000 people believed in Jesus that day and were baptised.

What a birthday! And like all babies the Christian Church has grown since then and grown exponentially so that it is spread across every country in the world and numbers about three billion people – a third of the world's population.

We will be celebrating that birthday at St Michael's on 23rd May in all our services. In the afternoon the children and families will celebrate it by letting off red balloons over Hoole with the children's messages of God's Love and power.

Two years ago one balloon reached France. Let's see this year how far we can spread the good news of Jesus.

Come and join us for our birthday celebrations.

And even more important, ask the Holy Spirit to transform your life and our community with power from on high.





Children and Families at St Michael's Church

It's been a busy few weeks for the children and families at church. We are very pleased to be back having in person Sunday School, and more recently we have been able to go back to in person weekly worship in school. Our first Sunday School was on Easter Sunday with the Easter egg hunt. 20 children searched the churchyard for eggs and were rewarded with chocolate eggs and they made an Easter garden to remind them of Jesus' death and resurrection. We are now back each week, either in school or in our new tent, which is much easier to put up and down than the old one, so can be easily stored in church if the weather looks bad.



Our latest Family Church was also back in church, as we enjoyed Toy Story church and the theme of friendship, both within the Toy Story films and the Bible. We looked at the

story of David and Jonathan, and thought about how sometimes friendships aren't what people expect and change over time, but are so important. The most important friendship we can have, is our friendship with God.

We made two crafts, both characters from the films and we had a trail and quiz around the churchyard which was lots of fun and gave everyone a good chance to run around! Our new venture in church is for older children, called Chat & Chocolate. We meet every fortnight in church for 45 minutes and we eat chocolate and chat about issues facing the young people and whatever they want to. It is currently for those who were confirmed in March, but hopefully we will soon open it up for anyone in school years 6-9.





The Scripture Union Revealing Jesus Framework is a new initiative by Scripture Union that has recently been launched nationally. It is a way of reaching the many children and young people who currently don't attend church. One of the ways SU are looking to reach these children and young people is through Faith Guides, who are people committed to trying to reach these people with the

Good News about Jesus. I have signed up to be a Faith Guide for our community. It doesn't change what I do, or cost the church anything, but connects me to other people doing a similar work to mine, and gives me support and resources from Scripture Union. My dear Nephew Darren

Since your parishioners mostly live in an area of half a square mile, where their only concern in getting to church is whether to take the underpass, or to risk a dash across the ring road, you may have little understanding of the problems our folk have in travelling our long country lanes to church, especially as we are keeping our social distance from each other.

Several parishioners have decided that they can't possibly share cars even with their own spouses, as in their 15-room homes they have successfully (and in some cases, happily) avoided each other for months. So the lane outside the church has filled up each week with Mercedes nudging Audis, and Land Rovers easing in between Bentleys.
