








FROM THE RECTORY



Dear all

Queen for 70 years! 70 years of selfless, faithful service to this nation and the Commonwealth. What a wonderful reason for a party and especially one which draws communities together.

So on Thursday 2nd June and Sunday 5th June Hoole is celebrating our Queen's Platinum Jubilee. There is a celebratory lunch in our magnificent new Village Hall, the Venue and then on Sunday we have a civic service in church at 10.30 for everyone with special children's activities during the service. After that on St Michael's school field there will be a village BBQ and Picnic from 12 – 4.00pm. Do try and make all or some of these events a priority - see inside for details.

A deeply inspiring book called Our Faithful Queen has been compiled for the occasion which will be available in church. It contains beautiful photos of key events and people from the Queen's 70 year reign together with inspirational quotations from Queen Elizabeth herself about the most important values and ideas on which she has built her life of faithful service.

Foremost among these are forgiveness and love. At Christmas in 2014 the Queen explained what inspired her to forgive. She said, "For me, the life of Jesus Christ, the Prince of peace, whose birth we celebrate today is an inspiration and anchor in my life. He is a role model of reconciliation and forgiveness. He stretched out His hands in love, acceptance and healing. Christ's example has taught me to seek to respect and value all people."

During her 70 years on the throne, the Queen has put duty before personal preference showing remarkable self-sacrifice. Her example is Jesus Christ. As she said, "Jesus Christ lived obscurely for most of his life and never travelled far. He was maligned and rejected by many though he had done no wrong. And yet, billions of people now follow his teaching and find in him the guiding

light for their lives. I am one of them. Because Christ's example helps me to see the value of doing small things with great love!"

Let us follow her example, learn from her and her Master Jesus Christ and let's celebrate that example together as a community in June.

March has given me a good chance to reflect on what it is I love about my job. I began the month struck down with Covid and ended the month with talking to over 300 children about the true meaning of Easter (some of them more than once!)

As I battled with recovery from Covid, I struggled with work. I knew I wanted to be there, but my body had other ideas! As I led Sunday School or chatted at Chat & Chocolate, I knew I was doing what God wanted but also knew I would be tired later. So, I had to try and prioritise, which hasn't been easy. What is it about my job that brings me such joy and knowledge that I'm doing God's work? The times I spend with children, young people and families in and around our church, whether that's at church or at school. So they were the bits I prioritised and made my main focus.

In the final week of March, as school terms ended, Ann and I were able to visit Little Hoole Primary School to lead two Easter assemblies, then to lead Easter RE lessons in every class at St Michael's School and then to lead their Easter Church Worship. What an opportunity to

share with these children about the true meaning of Easter!

As well as work in schools, we have had two Family Church services recently, both with



almost 100 people attending. The Village Hall has been full of the sounds of happy children and their parents and grandparents enjoying time together worshipping God at Pancake Church and Grandparents Church. It is great that we can provide a place where families come together to worship and many families

come along, who have no other connection to the church and we meet new people every month. Regular children's work within the church has grown over the past few months. Sunday School now has 3 groups – 0-3s, 3-7s and 7-11s, which means that the very young children who struggle to sit and listen, can go off and play with toys for a while and come back if they want to. This means that the 3-7s are less distracted by the tiny ones and can grow in their faith more. Chat & Chocolate continues for those in years 6-9 at school, on alternate Thursdays at 4:30 in church. This is a very laid-back group, where we try hard to have sensible conversations while we eat chocolate but can also just have fun.

My enforced time of reflection has made me realise, again, what a joy it is to work at St Michael's and what a privilege it is to share Jesus

"The Trial" – New departure for St Michael's

A play performed during a church service? Why not! *The Trial* was a stunning production written and directed by Steve Newman for the first performance of St Michael's Players. All the players clearly enjoyed participating in the drama.

The Trial was a thought provoking and challenging play exploring the Biblical account of Jesus' unjust trial before the weak and vacillating Pilate who knew Jesus was innocent but was not prepared to risk his career to see justice done. The play was very faithful to the Biblical account in terms of the conversation between Jesus and Pilate and, by including some new characters underlined the guilt of us all.

St. Michael's Players on Trial

In the first thirty years of the 20th century, the British dramatist, John Drinkwater, wrote, produced, and directed plays at the Birmingham Rep about real people, which included Oliver Cromwell, Mary Queen of Scots, and Abraham Lincoln. And it was Drinkwater's beautifully crafted plays, and the much later advice of novelist John Wain (one of the original 'Angry Young Men') in a Warwick pub back in the '80s when I asked him for advice: "Just do it, old man. You can't go wrong writing plays about long dead historical characters; always a good earner, as a certain Mr Shakespeare knew very well." Good advice that put me firmly on that well-trodden path.

A long and winding path it has been too that, on Good Friday, at St. Michael's Church, in a short play called The Trial, brought the newly minted St. Michael's Players to the public notice as they closed the afternoon service with a twenty-five-minute dramatic work out that took the congregation (and the actors) by storm.

The Trial is about the harrowing last hours of Jesus before his crucifixion, hours that had to be condensed into less than the length of an episode of an average TV sit-com.

To do it meant rehearsing in the church so that everyone could get a feel of the place as an acting space which, after the first three rehearsals, began to work its magic, with each actor creating individual characters of verisimilitude that just as quickly became an ensemble of determination and professionalism. What more could you want?

A means of maintaining energy and focus.

And that could only be done with rising anger and interaction (with characters extolling opposing views) that often took the actors by surprise, thereby increasing a personal determination to be heard: always, in rehearsals, ending, of course, in laughter and the need for tea, coffee, and chocolate biscuits, loads of chocolate biscuits.

We had become a team, with each team member aware of their importance within the whole. Theatrical magic.

Within the play Jesus must maintain an injured, and bloodied, stillness, with few words. Only at the end does he fall to his knees reciting the Lord's Prayer (an early version), with the Guard exchanging his spear (and removing his helmet) for a wooden cross he then carries for Jesus as they exit. Things are changing in the world.

Other than Jesus, at the centre of the play is a very bored, and somewhat ill Pontius Pilate, who not only has to cope with a man he knows must die (and a stroppy Clerk of the Court), but a man he also knows to be innocent. He is part of the inevitable drama. He just wants to go home to his villa in Rome.

To give Pilate even more grief I've introduced a Prosecutor, a cynical outsider whose purpose in life is to achieve the required result. Again, part of the heavenly plot.

Peter also appears as a witness who, as ever, denies Jesus three times. A bell tolls three times instead of a cock crowing - just a touch of John Donne for good measure.

In an attempt to muddy the waters three market stall holders are placed in the congregation to either defend Jesus, or scream for his death – 'crucify him, crucify him!' A device that builds the tension, and the fear for all concerned, and give the Clerk of the Court a very hard time keeping order.

To all of this we add live music, which gives a wholly new dimension to the words.

And the thing is it all worked wonderfully well.

QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE – "I WAS THERE"



We asked parishioners to let us have their memories of the Queen's Coronation. The response has been tremendous!

Coronation Year was very momentous for us. Tom and I had just moved into Hunter's Farm in Carr Lane and I

was pregnant with Janet. The due date was 5^{th} June. Any mother giving birth on the big day would receive a medal – but Janet was late.

I remember watching the Coronation on mum's new television, bought for the day. We had a full house with family and friends. Tom came when he could - he was very busy on the farm. It was spectacular. Betty

The Queen's coronation was in 1953. She ascended to be Monarch on 6th February 1952 on the death of her father King George, and the coronation was the following year. It was 2nd June during the week of my 9th birthday which was on 4th June 1953. The coronation day was a public holiday and I had my birthday party whilst the adults all sat around the radio listening to the coronation. Not many had televisions then.

I vividly remember the day at school in 1952 when all classes had to go to the school hall and there was very sombre music playing on the radio. The Headmaster then came on to the stage and announced "King George has sadly died during the night - God Save the Queen". Joan

I remember the death of George VI....Listen with Mother was cancelled and there was morbid music all day long.

We had a pageant at school and I was Britannia – as I was the tallest – complete with long robe and trident. We were each given a book each called *Elizabeth our Queen* which I still have and I also have a cardboard needle case in the shape of the Queen's State Coach (still fairly intact!). Margaret My memories of the events at this time are threefold and begin with death of the Queen's father, King George VI. This was on February 6^{th} 1952; as a young 12 year old I remember that the whole school was summoned into the school hall mid-morning for an announcement from the head master. We were all stunned when we heard of the King's death.

My second memory is of the build up to the Queen's coronation. In the early 1950s we were still in the aftermath of World War II and rationing had only just ended for some items. Cereal manufacturers boosted sales by printing figures for children to build up collections of the Coronation Procession. There were Lifeguards, Royal Horse Guards, Footmen and all the different Carriages which would be used in the procession. Of course no procession was complete until you got the Golden Coach in which the Queen would ride; when we finally got this the procession took pride of place on the sideboard.

Thirdly to the actual coronation itself. Like so many my family went to a neighbour's house to watch the events of the big day. I was best friend to their son John, so along with others, we all crowded into the living room of Jack and Ella Parsons, the only stipulation being "Bring your own chair". It should also be remembered that the TV on which we watched the coronation was a big box with a small 12 inch screen whose picture was black and white and often quite hazy – but happy days.

My memories of Coronation Day 1953 began about 10 days before 2nd June, when there was great excitement in the house – our first television arrived just in time for the festivities. My parents invited several of our neighbours in to watch the great event, with Mummy supplying sandwiches, cakes and endless cups of tea from our lovely old tea trolley. As an eight year old I was mesmerised by the magic of this beautiful queen, her ladies in waiting, the 'Cinderella' gold coach, and the joy of being able to watch the event as it happened. The magic of these state occasions has never left me, and I still avidly watch every one! As there were several girls around my age living within yards of our house at that time, I don't think we stopped dressing up and pretending we were princesses for weeks - Mummy's high heeled shoes took quite a battering!! Hilary I remember being pushed in my pale blue and cream pushchair through Hyde Park on the day of the Coronation and seeing the gold coach drive past. Ann

The morning of June 2nd, 1953, Coronation Day, was wet, with little sign of things brightening up. I was nearly six years old and was very proudly wearing my new cowboy outfit with two fully loaded six-shooters on my hips, and a 'ten-gallon' hat which was keeping out the rain, all given to me by my auntie Elsie, much to the annoyance of my mother and as the day progressed, the annoyance of just about everyone else.

The village where I lived in Worcestershire had arranged to hold a Coronation procession using three lorries belonging to Mr

Pritchard, the coalman. My father, a baker. was given the iob of organising the whole thing. When the lorries had been cleaned my family's upright piano was loaded on to one of them, added to which was a trumpeter and drummer. Then there was a group of children dancing on the second truck, with a tableau of the new queen sitting on her throne on the third.



My father played the piano during the procession

By this time the sun was shining,

with music and cheering from the whole village as we processed along, and me firing salutes with my six-shooters.

We then went home to watch the Coronation on the TV, along with most of the inhabitants of our street, with sandwiches, cakes and ale for everyone.

In the evening there was a dance at the WI Hall, with my father's band, augmented by a sax player (a young pilot from the RAF base), a pianist, with dad leading on his blue accordion. I can see all those joyful faces now.

My Coronation memories as a 7 year old start the day before on 1^{st} June because I was a bridesmaid that day and I was given a



Coronation commemorative Book of Common Prayer which had ER on the front and a picture of our new Queen inside.

In our house we had a cardboard model of the Gold Coach and two union flags with the Queen's picture in the centre.

I remember watching the Coronation on a

neighbour's TV sitting on the floor leaning on their green moquette suite. The only part of the ceremony which has stuck in my mind was the Queen having to take off her pretty dress and wear a gold robe, and then holding the Orb and Sceptre.

At school we were given a silver spoon and had our class photos taken which were mounted in this special folder. Besides the photo I still have the silver spoon, a commemorative Oxo tin and my Dad's beer glass.
