# **FROM THE RECTORY**

### Dear all

I imagine that many of you are great knitters or 'knotters'.

At our Service of Thanksgiving for Loved Ones I talked to the congregation about 4 (k)nots.

Ordinary knots can be life savers but these were spiritual nots which are even more important.

You need to start by disregarding the k and focusing on the not. I am going to repeat two of them:



The Bible is very clear – these are things we must not do. These are spiritual 'nots'.

### First: Forget not

'Bless the Lord O my soul, and forget not all His benefits'. Psalm 103 v 2

When someone dies it is easy and natural to be consumed with grief. But the moment families get together after the death of a loved one, almost always people are able to look back and remember with real thankfulness the good times and all the wonderful memories they have which made their loved one so special – the birth of a child, special holidays and family Christmases etc.

So in November, in this month of remembering, don't forget to say thank you to our Heavenly Father for all his generous gifts and supremely for the gift of his own Son Jesus the Saviour.

### And second: Fear not

We sang at the thanksgiving service the famous hymn The Lord's my Shepherd. What an amazing hymn! It's based on Psalm 23 and it never ceases to give comfort and strength to those who take on board what it says. God is with you every step of the way throughout your life. He provides all the good things you enjoy and He is there even in the most demanding times; even through the Valley of the shadow of death He is with you. In fact Jesus has gone through the valley of death already to prepare a place for us and therefore we are not to let our hearts be troubled or to be afraid. Fear not, be not afraid is a phrase used 365 times in the Bible – once for every day of the year – Fear not – we have no need to be afraid: the One who created the Universe and defeated death is there beside us.

And hold on to those two nots, Forget not and Fear not. Don't let these knots slip or loosen. Your life, the whole of your life now and in eternity depends on it.

Keep those knots before you as we move towards Christmas. As you prepare for what we all hope can be a 'normal' Christmas and we sing all those wonderful evocative carols, don't forget the real meaning of Christmas – God Himself has come among us as a human being. At Christmas we are celebrating the rescue of the human race from sin and death made possible by the sacrifice of Jesus of Nazareth, God's only son.

COP 26 has made us more aware than ever before that there needs to be an urgent rescue strategy if our planet and hence the human race is to survive. The climate conference is a global wakeup call for the need for action now. No less urgent and of even greater significance is the need for a worldwide spiritual awakening to recognise the salvation that Jesus the Saviour has

already won for us on the cross and to turn to Him in penitence and faith this Christmas.

### MEMORIES OF HMS DIANA AND THE ATOMIC BOMB

Early in 1956 whilst I was still young and foolish and in the navy, I decided to volunteer to become what was called a frogman. Part way through the course the ship I was due to join, HMS Diana, came into port. I told my instructor of my problem and it was decided I should finish the course and join the ship later when she came back. It was only when the full facts of where HMS Diana had been and done came to light that I realised how lucky I had been. God had other plans for me, we went to Cyprus during the EOKA crisis where I searched the bottom of ships for limpet mines, and then to Iceland to join in the "Cod War" to stop gun boats like the "Odin" and "Thor" from attacking our trawlers, followed by a trip to Lebanon where a mini war had broken out. I could write a book about all the things I was involved in, but that is another story. It was only when the full facts came out about where Diana had been in my absence that it came home to me what a lucky young man I was and how God was protecting me. I shall spend the rest of my life thanking God for my life.

So what mission had HMS Diana been on while I was training to become a frogman? Well in March 1956 the governments of the UK and America were afraid of a conflict with Russia and that following the use of Atomic weapons to end the war in the Pacific at the end of WW2, would almost certainly lead to atomic weapons been used in any new conflict. America was unwilling to share its expertise in these new weapons so the British and French embarked on a programme of developing their own nuclear weapons. The development of these entailed a series of tests held both on small islands off the East coast of Australia and in the Indian Ocean. Although the devastation caused by the bombs that dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki had been documented, at this time little was understood on the effects of radiation on those outside the immediate blast zone.

One of the experiments that the military commanders were keen to conduct was how long could forces fight for with and without protective equipment in an environment contaminated by radioactive fallout. HMS Diana, her captain John Gower and close knit crew of 300 were detailed to provide some of these answers by deliberately steaming thought a radioactive cloud following the test explosions. The crew were issued with Polaroid sunglasses, facemasks and overshoes. Over a five-week period, the crew witnessed two explosions, the second of which took place on June 19, 1956, and was equivalent to 98,000 tons of TNT, more than seven times the power of the bomb dropped on Hiroshima in 1945.

After the ship cruised to its standby position in the Indian Ocean, the crew were gathered on deck, the majority wearing shorts and sandals, and a few with newly issued sunglasses. They were not offered full protective clothing. They were then told to have their backs to the direction of the blast and to cover their eyes from the nuclear flash - which, even from a distance of many miles, could have burnt out a human retina. Once the flash had disappeared, they were to turn and face the detonation and watch the mushroom cloud rise into the tropical sky.

Capt John Gower, a decorated veteran of the Normandy landings, recalled the moment in an account he wrote some years later.

"The flash was observed at 10.14am from a distance of 97 miles. The fireball was twice the size of Mosaic I (the previous detonation) and climbed a lot faster. The explosion when it came was a colossal double crack, heard 200 miles away in Australia."

After the blast, the crew were ordered to take up "action stations" below deck as the ship steered a course through the radioactive cloud. Around the ship, Geiger counters began to tick and then roar into life, as the lethal radioactive cloud enveloped Diana. As the outside of the vessel became "hot" with radiation, the men entombed within the steel hull sweltered for 13 long hours, until the allclear was given. Afterwards, the ship's exterior was hosed down with sea water and any material that was found to be radioactive was thrown overboard. Despite this, one of the main boilers became radioactive and had to be repaired.

In addition to Capt Gower and his crew a total of about 22,000 servicemen from Britain, Australia, New Zealand, the US and other countries witnessed hundreds of nuclear test explosions and many were contaminated with radioactive fallout. Thousands died prematurely, often in extreme agony and despite the ex-servicemen campaigning against their governments to accept liability, this has not been accepted.

In the UK only about 700 remain of those who witnessed these explosions and most of these are suffering some form of cancer.

Sadly though, it seems that the Government would rather forget the sacrifices made by those who took part in the secret trials, for the sake of their country, more than 60 years ago – but I WILL REMEMBER THEM for the rest of my life. Bill Carr – Church Warden Emeritus
